






Lawrence B. Stephens

Below is a short history of 336th FIS Rocketeer pilot Lt. Larry Stephens after he finished his 1954 tour with the U.S. Air Force in Kimpo, Korea and Misawa, Japan.


In 1955 Larry Stephens returned to the States and continued his career in the Navy flying TV-2s (T-33s) and F9Fs. In 1956 he became the Gunnery Co-Champion of the 7th fleet (picture on pg 18). He was stationed in Norfolk, VA for awhile but was later transferred to Olatha, KS, to begin work with the Jet Transitional Training Unit (JTTU). He served as an instructor/pilot during this tour. In 1958 he moved his family back to Norfolk, VA where he was stationed at Norfolk Naval Base. Later that year he was sent to CIC school in GA for training and then transferred to NYC for 6 months to help get the USS Independence (CV-62) ready for service. In 1959 he moved back to Norfolk, VA and continued to serve aboard the USS Independence. In 1960 he began flying F8s (picture on pg 21) and transferred to VF-33 flying out of Oceana Naval Base, Virginia Beach, VA. In 1962 he was transferred to the USS Enterprise (CVN-65) flying F8s. In the summer of 1963 he was transferred to Cecil Field, Fla. (near Jacksonville) flying with VF-174. In the summer of 1965 he retired from the Navy as a Cdr. after 22 years of service.

In 1965 he was divorced and moved to Richmond, VA where he began selling aircraft for Cessna. In 1968 he moved to Knoxville, TN and became the corporate pilot for a engineering and construction firm. In 1974 he left the engineering and construction firm and began attending the University of Tennessee in Knoxville. He received a degree in horticulture and worked for the State of Tennessee as a mine inspector. He continued in this position until he retired in the early 80s. He passed away in March 1990 eleven days before his 64th birthday.




